2020 Voting Information

The Amputee Coalition is a nonpartisan, nonprofit organization and this is nonpartisan information to empower the civic participation of the limb loss and limb difference community.



The 2020 election will look a bit different than a typical year due to COVID-19. To avoid anticipated long lines on Election Day (Nov. 3), and to reduce risk of exposure to the virus, voting early is highly encouraged and many states are making it easier for voters to cast their ballots in advance. Below is nonpartisan information about how to register to vote, check your registration, and make a plan to vote, as well as information by state for where to apply for an absentee ballot, deadlines to request applications, dates for early inperson voting, and deadlines for mail-in ballots.

VOTING

Register to Vote

 If you haven't registered to vote yet, the clock is ticking in many states and you need to act fast to ensure you can cast a ballot in the upcoming general election on November 3.
Most registration deadlines are in early to mid-October.

Check Your Voter Registration

 Even if you're registered and have voted in past elections, it is always a good idea to check your voter registration to ensure that your information is accurate, so you won't have any issues voting.

Make a Plan to Vote

- The most important action you can do beyond casting your ballot is having a plan to vote, especially this year.
- Check absentee ballot request and early voting deadlines for your state.
- Know where ballot drop-off locations are (if your state has them) to avoid mail delivery delays.
- If you plan to vote in person on Election Day, ensure you know where your polling place is, have scouted out the location beforehand, know hours of operation, and are prepared to wait in line for potentially a long period of time.
